"Marriages among the Germans are severe," says Tacitus ; "vices are not a subject of ridicule to them [1] ; to corrupt or be corrupted are not considered a custom or a manner of living ; "there are few examples in such a populous nation of the violation of conjugal troth." [2]

That explains the expulsion of Childebert : he affronted rigid ways which the conquest had not had time to change.
