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## III.6 How virtue is compensated for under monarchical government

I am moving quickly and taking long strides so it will not be thought I am satirizing monarchical government. No: if it lacks one driving force, it has another. Honor, which is to say the prejudice of each person and of every rank, takes the place of virtue, and represents it everywhere; honor can inspire the finest deeds; it can, combined with the force of the laws, lead to the government's ends like virtue itself.

Thus, in well-ordered monarchies, everyone will be more or less a good citizen, and rarely will anyone be found who is a man of good will; for being a man of good will requires that that be his intention. [1]
