

## VI.10 On the old French laws

In many of the old French laws we find the spirit of the monarchy. In cases involving pecuniary penalties, non-nobles are punished less than nobles. [1] In crimes it is just the opposite [2]: the noble loses honor and his voice in court, whereas the commoner who has no honor is punished corporally.
